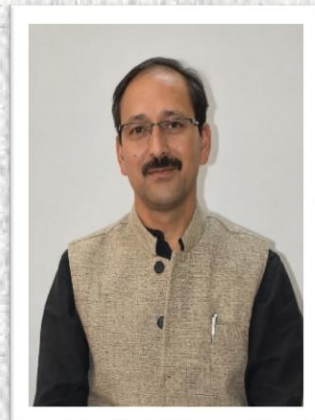
This timeless quote perfectly captures the educational philosophy of Government Degree College, Nankhari. We believe education is not merely the transmission of information but the awakening of curiosity

ABOUT THE COLLEGE

It is situated in the far flung snowbound areas of the mid-mountain ranges of the Himalayas at an altitude of approximately 2500 meters. Because of the challenging conditions only a few fortunate boys & girls could afford to go to either Rampur or Shimla to acquire higher education.

The opening of this college in such a difficult terrain has not only saved them from moving out but has also inspired the poor and the needy one's to pursue their ambition of higher education. The college promises to be a huge potential for excellence in the field of education as it will cater to the academic ambitions of the students from nearby twelve Govt. as well as private Sr. Sec. Schools and also the adjoining schools of Rohru and Jubbal & Kotkhai Tehsils. The college in Nankhari will not only give a boost to Women education & empowerment but will also help explore the still undiscovered wealth of the place - Ecotourism.

Presently the college is being run in the Vocational building of Govt. Sr. Sec. School Nankhari. The college has successfully implemented University Grants Commission (UGC) Choice Based Credit System (CBCS), Annual system as adopted by Himachal Pradesh University (HPU) Shimla-5 since 2018. **From this academic session, the college is adopting the HPU NEP 2020 course curriculum; hence, the semester system is introduced for students taking admission from the 2026-27 session onwards. The college is offering only 3-year Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary B.A. and B. Com Pass Programmes for the session 2026-27.**

OVERVIEW OF THE CREDIT FRAMEWORK FOR UG PROGRAMMES (NEP 2020)

APPLICABLE FOR 2026-27 BATCH ONWARDS (NEW STUDENTS)

The National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 presents a transformative framework for India's higher education system, with a strong emphasis on the holistic development of learners to address the demands of the 21st century. The policy seeks to shift from rigid and conventional academic structures to a more flexible and learner-centric approach that promotes creativity, critical thinking, and social responsibility. Some of the major reforms introduced under NEP 2020 are as follows:

- a) **Flexible Duration of Degree Programmes:** Undergraduate education is designed in both 3-year and 4-year formats.
- b) **Multiple Entry and Exit Provisions:** Students are allowed to leave a programme at different stages with suitable qualifications such as a certificate, diploma, or degree, while also retaining the option to re-enter and continue their studies later.
- c) **Academic Bank of Credits (ABC):** A digital credit repository has been introduced to enable the accumulation, transfer, and redemption of academic credits, thereby facilitating greater mobility across institutions.
- d) **Multidisciplinary Education:** Learners are encouraged to study subjects across various disciplines instead of being confined to traditional streams, enabling them to customize their educational pathways according to their interests and aspirations.

HP-Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes

In accordance with national educational objectives and the UGC-CCFUGP guidelines issued in December 2022, Himachal Pradesh University has formulated the Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes (HPU-CCFUGP, hereafter referred to as HPU-UGP). This framework integrates all the key components of the UGC-CCFUGP with the aim of effectively implementing and realizing the vision and objectives outlined in the NEP 2020.

UG Degree Programmes

The UGC-CCFUGP 3.2.3 provides students with multiple options for pursuing undergraduate degree programmes. Under the revised HP-CCFUGP framework, students may opt for either a 3-year degree programme or a 4-year degree programme leading to Honours or Honours with Research. **For the academic session 2026–27, the college is offering only 3-Year Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary BA and B. Com Pass Programmes.**

i. 3-Year Undergraduate Programme:

In the 3-year UG programme, students are required to declare their major and minor subjects at the end of the second semester. The programme offers the following two degree pathways:

a. **Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary: (Offered by GC Nankhari for the session 2026-27)**

In this option, the credits for core courses are distributed across different subjects and disciplines in accordance with the prescribed programme structure.

b. **Single Major:**

Under the single major pathway, a student must earn at least 50 per cent of the total credits in the chosen major discipline.

ii. 4-Year Undergraduate Programme:

Students who complete a 3-year multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary degree may continue into the fourth year to obtain an Honours degree, provided they have studied 6 DSC courses and 5 DSE courses in the concerned subject during the first three years. Students graduating with a 3-year UG degree under the single major system shall pursue the fourth year in the same major discipline. The 4-year UG programme includes the following two options:

a. **Honours:** An Honours degree may be pursued only in the subject in which the student has either

completed a 3-year UG programme with a single major or studied 6 DSC courses and 5 DSE courses during the 3-year multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary programme.

b. Honours with Research:

Students securing 75 per cent or above aggregate marks up to Semester VI (completion of the 3-year degree) shall be eligible to pursue a 4-year Honours with Research programme, subject to the availability of the programme and approval from Himachal Pradesh University.

The Programme Components

The entire 3-year/4-year UG programme curriculum is divided into two parts: (a) Core Courses and (b) Common Courses, which are described below.

- 1) Core Courses: These courses are designed to provide in-depth knowledge and specialisation in a student's chosen field of study. All core courses have a credit allocation of 4.
 - a) Discipline-Specific Course (DSC) / Major Courses: These are the primary subjects of focus that allow for rigorous, in-depth study. For a UG degree in a single major, at least 50% of total credits shall be in that major subject (64 credits for a 3-year degree and 84 for a 4-year degree).
 - b) Discipline-Specific Elective (DSE): These are advanced courses within the major subject that offer further specialisation. A 3-year single major programme includes 5 DSE courses.
 - c) Minor Stream Courses (MC): These courses are offered by a department to students majoring in other disciplines. They aim to provide a broader understanding and perspective beyond the primary major. A student must earn at least 24 credits in their minor over three years.
- 2) Common Courses: These courses are mandatory for all 3-year or 4-year undergraduate students, regardless of their major. Together, they account for 36 credits and are divided over 5 subdivisions.
 - a) Multidisciplinary Courses (MDC): These are introductory courses from broad disciplines other than the student's major or minor. Students take 9 credits of MDC and are encouraged to choose a different subject each semester.
 - b) Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC): Focused on language and communication skills, these 8-credit courses include English, Hindi, and Sanskrit.
 - c) Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC): These 9-credit courses focus on practical and vocational skill-building. Two of these (SEC-I and SEC-II) must be related to the student's core or minor disciplines.
 - d) Value-Addition Courses (VAC): These 6-credit courses focus on ethics and human values. Examples include Universal Human Values, which fosters self-awareness, and Understanding India, which covers constitutional obligations and national development goals.
 - e) Internship/Apprenticeship/Project/Community Outreach (I/A/P/C): This 4-credit component provides experiential learning by placing students in actual work situations, laboratories or community service projects. These courses are common to all students and will be carried out during the winter and summer terms/vacations.

Duration for Award of UG Certificate, UG Diploma and Degree

Under the Himachal Pradesh University (HPU) Curriculum and Credit Framework, undergraduate programmes are designed with a flexible duration of 3 or 4 years, allowing for multiple exit options with specific certifications based on the credits earned. The duration and requirements for each award are as follows:

- 1) UG Certificate: Awarded after 1 year (2 semesters) of study upon securing 44 credits. This must include 4 credits from an internship, apprenticeship, project, or community outreach (I/A/P/C) or work-based vocational courses completed during winter or summer terms.
- 2) UG Diploma: Awarded after 2 years (4 semesters) of study upon securing 86 credits.
- 3) 3-Year Bachelor's Degree: Awarded after 3 years (6 semesters) of study upon successful completion of 128 credits.
- 4) 4-Year Bachelor's Degree (Honours): Awarded after 4 years (8 semesters) of study upon securing 168 credits.
- 5) 4-Year Bachelor's Degree (Honours with Research): Awarded after 4 years (8 semesters) upon securing 168 credits. This track requires a research project or dissertation (12 credits) completed under the guidance of an eligible faculty member.

- Note: a) While students can take breaks during their studies, the total time to complete any programme cannot exceed 7 years.
- b) Students will be allowed to enter/re-enter in the odd semesters and after even semesters, provided they fulfil the minimum requirements for entry and exit.
 - c) Any certificate, diploma, or degree is only awarded if the student has successfully passed all the required courses up to that point.
 - d) A student who exits after 3 years with a bachelor's degree cannot re-enter the programme for a fourth year later.

Academic Bank of Credits (ABC)

The HPU-UGP is directly connected to the Academic Bank of Credit (ABC) as notified by the UGC. All credits a student earns at the end of an examination in HPU-UGP will be deposited in the ABC by the university. As such, a student under HPU-UGP must register for the ABC as notified by the regulatory agencies.

Multiple Exits and Entries

The NEP 2020 offers students multiple entry and exit options in undergraduate programs, providing flexibility to accommodate various learning paces and life circumstances. As permitted under the UGC Guidelines for Multiple Entry and Exit in Academic Programmes offered in Higher Education Institutions, students will be allowed to enter/re-enter in the odd semesters and after even semesters, provided they fulfil the minimum requirements for entry and exit.

Entry Points: Students can enter the undergraduate program at the beginning of any academic year.

Exit Points and Corresponding Qualifications:

- 1) After 1 year: Undergraduate Certificate
- 2) After 2 years: Undergraduate Diploma
- 3) After 3 years: Bachelor's Degree or Bachelor's Degree with Single Major
- 4) After 4 years: Bachelor's Degree with Honours or Bachelor's Degree with Honours with Research

Re-entry: Students who exit at any point have the option to re-enter the course within three years; however, they must complete their degree within a maximum of seven years from the original date of admission. The NAD Cell of HPU will evaluate the multiple entry and exit points to determine the eligibility of students who desire to join the University from other HEIs with lateral entry.

Programme Structure

- 1) Semester: A semester comprises 90 working days, and the academic calendar is divided into two semesters.
- 2) Credit Hours: According to the Himachal Pradesh Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes, credits are defined as the unit by which coursework is measured. It determines the number of hours of instruction required per week over the duration of a semester (minimum of 15 weeks). The system uses the following criteria for measuring credit hours:
 - a) Credit Hour Definition: A credit determines the number of hours of instruction required per week over a semester of at least 15 weeks.
 - b) Lecture Courses: For one-hour lectures per week, each hour is counted as one credit. In a 15-week semester, a three-credit lecture course equals 45 teaching hours.
 - c) Tutorials: One credit for tutorial work represents one hour of engagement per week.
 - d) Practicum/Laboratory/Field Work: One credit in these areas requires two hours of engagement per week. This also applies to seminars, internships, and community engagement.
 - e) Experiential Learning: For activities like industrial or field visits, one credit equals three hours of engagement per week.
 - f) Combined Credits: A single course can combine different credit types. For example, a 4-credit course might consist of three 1-hour lectures (3 credits) and one 2-hour practicum (1 credit) per week.
 - g) A course can have a combination of lecture credits, tutorial credits, and practicum credits

Semester-Wise Programme Components

During the first and second semesters, students will study three Discipline-Specific Core (DSC) courses from a single stream, namely A, B, and C. Students enrolled in the stream-based multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary UG programme will be required to designate one of these three subjects as their minor at the end of the second semester, while the remaining two subjects will continue as their core (major) subjects. Such students will study the DSE courses related to their core subjects, excluding the chosen minor subject.

Students opting for the single core discipline (major) pathway will also select their major and minor subjects from among the three subjects studied during the first two semesters at the end of the second semester.

In addition to the core curriculum, students will have the opportunity to choose courses according to their interests from the multidisciplinary, ability enhancement, skill enhancement, and value addition categories. Furthermore, students will participate in internships, apprenticeships, field projects, or community engagement and service programmes, along with field-based learning activities and minor projects.

Note: Students studying a multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary 3-year degree are strongly advised to choose one subject for all the DSEs in which they wish to do honours or honours with research in the fourth year, as they must study at least 5 DSEs of that discipline in the first three years.

Important Note: The college offers only 3 Year (up-to sixth semester) Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary B.A. and B. Com Pass programmes for the session 2026-27

3. At the end of the second semester, each student may choose one of two programmes: the Multi-Disciplinary/Interdisciplinary or Single Core Discipline (Major) programme. The student choosing the latter will be required to give his/her Major and Minor at the end of the second semester. Such choices, including DSCs made at the end of the second semester, shall remain in effect until the VI semester.
4. Additional Seats: The Colleges may create 10% extra seats over and above the sanctioned strength to accommodate the request for a change of major. Any unfilled or vacant seats may be filled with those seeking a change of Major. Preference will be given to those with the highest CGPA and no arrears in the first year/semester.
5. The DSCs of another discipline for the first two semesters of students who opt for Major programmes will be treated as Minors.
6. A DSC offered in one discipline will be treated as a Minor by another. Students can choose Minor Courses from two different subjects, but must earn a minimum of 12 credits in each.
7. MDCs must be selected from a broad discipline/pool of MDCs other than Major and Minor subjects.
8. AEC/VAC/SEC-3 should be chosen from a pool of courses. Every discipline shall provide these courses, some of which will be offered discipline-specific, while the rest can be open to students of all other disciplines. However, the two SECs (SEC-1 & SEC-2) must be chosen from the discipline-specific (Core and Minor).
9. A maximum of two language courses can be opted for as Core and Minor. AECs should be in a language other than what is studied in DSCs/Minors.
10. I/A/P/C will be determined at the end of the first semester to enable students to carry out some I/A/P/C activities during winter vacation.
11. To pursue an Honour degree in the 4th year, students will have to choose only one discipline in both semesters, in which s/he have studied 6 DSCs and 5 DSEs in the first three years.
12. A student who secures 75% or more marks in aggregate till semester 6 (up to a 3-year degree) shall be eligible for a 4-year degree Honours with Research, provided HPU has approved the college to offer it.
13. One course per semester (DSC/Minor/MDC/SEC/etc) from a subject offered in two (or more) different programs (e.g. BCA and BSc/ BPA and BA/ BFA and BA/ Shastri and BA/etc) must be the same.
14. Students in the BA programmes can opt for only one DSC each from the Bachelor of Performing Arts (Dance, Music, Vocal & Instrument/Tabla/ etc.) and the Bachelor of Fine Arts (Painting/Applied Arts/Sculpture/ etc.).
15. Major and Minor shall be awarded on fulfilment of the following conditions: For Major, 64 credits in a 3-year & 84 credits in a 4-year UG programme in a single Major Discipline. For Minor 28 credits in 4-year UG programme in a single Minor Discipline
16. The Dissertation and Project will start in the VII semester. However, the evaluation and assessment will be conducted in both the VII and VIII semesters.

**As this scheme is being introduced for the first time, it is subject to modifications. Any changes applied in subsequent years after admission to the 1st Year will be retrospectively applicable.*

- In the first semester, students will choose three subjects, A/B/C, within the same stream. In the Multidisciplinary UG Programme, at the end of the second semester, each student will choose any two of the three (A/B/C) subjects as DSC and one subject as a minor course. Therefore, the DSC and MC subjects will be decided only at the end of the second semester depending on the programme and subjects selected
- Students studying a multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary 3-year degree are strongly advised to choose one subject for all the DSEs in which they wish to do Honours or honours with research in the fourth year, as they must study at least 5 DSEs of that discipline in the second and third years.
- The SEC-1 and SEC 2 must be chosen from the Discipline - Specific (Core and Minor) subjects. Therefore, students must carefully select SEC courses based on the DSC/Major and Minor (MC) choices they intend to make for the third semester.
- A maximum of 2 language courses can be opted for as Core or Minor. AECs should be in a language other than what is studied in DSCs/Minor.
- VAC should be chosen from a pool of courses offered by the institution.
- VA/PIC Shall be determined at the end of the first semester to enable students to carry out some V/A/PIC activities during winter vacation.

Examination & Grading

The examination and grading modalities of the HPU Undergraduate Programme (HPU-UGP) will be governed by the Himachal Pradesh University's official Examination and Grading Ordinance/Notifications. The assessment and evaluation system is structured according to the credit value of each course. The 4-credit courses, including Discipline Specific Core (DSC), Discipline Specific Elective (DSE), and Minor Courses (MC), along with 3-credit courses such as Multidisciplinary Courses (MDC) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC), and 2-credit courses like Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC), Value Added Courses (VAC), and Add-on Courses (AOC), are evaluated through a two-part system. These two components are:

- a) Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA): The CCA component assesses students throughout the semester through class tests, assignments, presentations, attendance, and other academic activities.
- b) End Semester Examination (ESE): The End Semester Examination evaluates students' understanding and performance at the conclusion of the semester through a formal written examination.

An Overview of the UGC-CBCS (Choice-Based Credit System)

Undergraduate Programmes

(Applicable only for 2nd and 3rd year students)

The CBCS provides an opportunity for the students to choose courses from the prescribed courses comprising Core, Compulsory, Skill Enhancement and Elective Courses. The courses are evaluated by following a grading system. In order to bring uniformity in the evaluation system and computation of the Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) based on student's performance in examinations, the UGC has formulated the guidelines to be followed.

Outline of Courses under Choice Based Credit System (CBCS):

1. **Core Course:** A course, which should compulsorily be studied by a candidate as a core requirement is termed as Core Course.
2. **Elective Course:** Generally, a course which can be chosen from a pool of courses and which may be specific or specialized or advanced or supportive to the discipline/subject of study or which provides an extended scope or which enables an exposure to some other discipline/subject/domain or nurtures the candidate's proficiency/skill is called an Elective Course.
 - 2.1 **Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) Course:** Elective course offered by the main discipline/subject of study is referred to as Discipline Specific Elective. The University/Institute may also offer discipline related Elective courses of interdisciplinary nature (to be offered by main discipline/subject of study).
 - 2.2 **Dissertation/Project:** An elective course designed to acquire special/advanced knowledge, such as supplement study/support study to a project work, and a candidate studies such a course on his own with an advisory support by a teacher/faculty member is called dissertation/project.
 - 2.3 **Generic Elective (GE) Course:** An elective course which is other than discipline specific core course and is chosen generally from an unrelated discipline/subject, with an intention to seek exposure is called a Generic elective.
3. **Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC):** The Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC) may be of two kinds: Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC). "AECC" courses are the courses based upon the content that leads to knowledge enhancement: (i) Environmental Science and (ii) English/MIL Communication. These are mandatory for all disciplines. Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) are value-based and/or skill-based and are aimed at providing hands-on-training, competencies, skills, etc.
 - 3.1 **Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC):** Environmental Science, English Communication/Modern Indian Language (MIL) Communication.
 - 3.2 **Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC):** These courses may be chosen from a pool of courses designed to provide value-based and/or skill-based knowledge.

Evaluation System of Undergraduate CBCS Programme.

As per RUSA/HP University guidelines, the marks scheme for all undergraduate courses in annual system for **BA/B.Com** will be in the ratio of **70:30**, i.e., 70 marks for theory (Annual/Term End Examination) and 30 marks for **Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA)/Internal Assessment (IA)**. In annual system for all courses of **B.Com practical subjects** the ratio will be **50:20:30**, i.e. 50 marks for theory and 20 marks for **practical** (Annual/Term End) and 30 marks for **CCA/IA**.

As per University norms 30% marks of CCA will be determined by the concerned teacher in the annual system on the basis of following components:

1. House Test = 10
2. Term Test/Class Test = 05
3. Assignments/Seminars = 10
4. Class room attendance = 5

In the annual system class room attendance will be defined as follows:

75% — 80%	1 mark
80% — 85%	2 marks
85% — 90%	3 marks
90% — 95%	4 marks
95% and above	5 marks

Mid Term / House Test

- One **Mid Term/House Test** of 10 marks (Annual System) will be conducted in each academic year.
- It is mandatory for every student to appear in the Mid Term/House Test and the marks obtained shall contribute to the total IA/CCA of 30%.
- As per University guidelines the students who do not get 35% marks in IA/CCA will not be allowed to appear in Annual Examination.

Other Information Related to Evaluation under UG CBCS Programme

1. Internal Assessment/Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA) and Term End Examinations will be as per RUSA provisions for annual system.
2. In annual system, the minimum passing marks is 40% in aggregate. However, it is mandatory to score 35% in CCA and also 35% in the Final Examination for passing.
3. A candidate failing either in one or two subjects/papers in annual examination will be placed under compartment in those subjects/papers. Such students will have only two chances-- one at supplementary stage and another at the annual stage to clear his/her compartment.
4. A candidate failing in three or more subjects/papers will be treated as fail in that year and will have to repeat the entire year.
5. The result shall be declared as per grading system and the students will have to complete the degree within 5 years.
6. Re-evaluation shall be applicable as per provisions of HP University ordinance for annual system.
7. Final examinations shall be held in the month of March/April and supplementary examinations in the month of September/October every year.

Note: The above guidelines/conditions may vary as per latest notification by the University.

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Admission to BA/ B. Com 1st Semester under HPU NEP-2020 Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary Course Curriculum:

Eligibility for Admission

1. **Bachelor of Arts (BA Pass Course):** The students who have passed +2 examinations or an examination equivalent to a Board/University established by law in India, passing in four written subjects (including English) with 33% marks.
2. **Bachelor of Commerce (B. Com Pass Course):** The candidates with 40% marks in commerce stream or 45% marks in four written subjects, including English at +2 level, are eligible for admission to B. Com pass course. The minimum eligibility condition for a girl student to get admission in B. Com is 33% marks in +2 examination. However, for admission to B. Com pass course the candidate must have passed Mathematics or Economics as compulsory subject at his/her +2 stage.

- Note:**
- i. All the admissions in BA/ B. Com 1st Semester will be made on the basis of merit of the qualifying examination, that is, on the basis of percentage/marks of +2 examination.
 - ii. The student placed under compartment or failed in +2 examinations are not eligible for seeking admission.

Age Limit and Relaxation

1. Admission is not granted to the student in 1st Semester if he/she has attained the age of 23 in the case of boys and 25 in the case of girls on 1st July of the year concerned.
2. The upper age limit will be raised by three years for students belonging to SC/ST categories.
3. The Principal has a discretion to provisionally grant age relaxation to the students of general category up to a maximum of six months subject to the final approval by the Vice-Chancellor of H.P. University.

CONDUCT AND DISCIPLINE

Leave Rules:

1. A student can proceed on leave with the prior permission from the college Principal. The application should also be prior signed by parent/ guardian of the student and duly recommended by the teacher.
2. A teacher can sanction leave up to maximum of 5 days and leave for longer duration will be sanctioned by the college Principal.
3. The student should make sure that the leave is noted by all the concerned teachers.
4. Leave on account of illness, if more than three days, must be accompanied by the medical certificate.
5. Students participating in various inter-college or inter-university or other competitions will have to get their leave sanctioned by the college Principal on the recommendation of their in-charges before their departure.

Note:

- **General leave will only be counted for the relaxation in fine only and not be counted as the lecture attended.**
- **In case of participation in sports, cultural, NSS and other activities, the credit will be given to the students and days engaged in these activities will be counted as lectures attended.**

Other Rules and Regulations:

1. Students will be issued identity cards by the college. It is mandatory for all the students to carry the identity cards to college every day.
2. It is mandatory for every student to maintain strict discipline within the college premises. Any act of a student that amounts to indiscipline will be dealt strictly. The following act comes within the ambit of indiscipline and misconduct: -
 - Ragging in and around the college campus
 - Eve-teasing
 - Scribbling/ Writing anything on the white-board, smart boards, furniture, walls, etc.
 - Damaging college property-- Breaking furniture/ window panes/ Tempering electrical and water fittings
 - Removing notices
 - Holding any meeting/ function/ party in the college premises without any prior permission of the Principal
 - Using foul language in the campus
 - Bringing outsiders to the campus
 - Smoking/ chewing tobacco, taking drugs/ intoxicants/ alcohol anywhere in the college premises
 - Any other act or acts which the Principal considers as major acts of misconduct and indiscipline
3. All the students are directed to read the notices displayed on the college notice board every day and do the needful accordingly.
4. Use of mobile phones is prohibited in classrooms and examination hall.
5. The name of a student shall be struck off from the college rolls, if there is an absence without sanctioned leave continuously for 10 days or more.
6. Regarding Readmission: If the name of a student is struck off, he/ she must be accompanied by his/ her parent or guardian at the time of re-admission. **The student must seek re-admission within six days of the notice regarding the same.**
